





A Word from the Principal

Last week one of our long standing Walkers bus drivers, Peter McDermott, passed away unexpectedly. For some of our students who had known Peter since Kindergarten this was heartbreaking news. He had driven them home the night before and for many their last memories of Peter will be saying goodbye as they hopped off the bus. In the sharing of the information with the students it became obvious very quickly what a much loved and respected man Peter was. The students shared stories of how he had made them laugh, given them nicknames (which also made them laugh), dropped them home. He was very highly thought of by the students and the positive impact that Peter had is not measurable. I am not sure if Peter was aware of this impact but it was evident to the adults in the room. Often we do not see the impact we have on others, we go about our daily business with our blinkers on.

Another staff member who has a very positive impact on our students is Mrs Robyn Bessell. I am aware of the generosity of staff to cover this for Robyn and the College.

Mrs Dianne Ranalli is also retiring from the College. Di has been the mainstay of our Uniform Shop for many years. She is often the first face of the College and I receive a number of emails at the beginning of each year highlighting how special she makes each student feel. Her gentleness and humour are always appreciated by the new students who may be feeling just a bit anxious. The College has been lucky to have Di as long as we have. What is evident to me is that the Mount Carmel College community has a great many staff who positively impact the students' lives. They model respect and care, courtesy and kindness. They challenge gently and remove the barriers for the many students they come into contact with. For the community, these "losses" are a gentle reminder to be present. To notice those around us who quietly make a difference to our lives and be grateful for the interactions that we have with them. At the end of the lesson, at the end of the day the smiles and the thanks are heartfelt and build a positive community for our students.

Wellbeing and Goal Setting Conferences

The Year 7–10 Clan Teacher Wellbeing and Goal Setting Conferences which were held on the evening on the Monday 18 February are designed for Clan teachers to meet with parents/carers and students to discuss their goals for 2019.

The process of setting goals allows students to choose where they want to go in school and what they want to achieve. By knowing what they want to achieve, they know what they have to concentrate on and improve. Goal setting gives students long-term vision and short-term motivation. 
Year 10 Meningococcal immunisation will be held at the College in Term 2/3 with a date to be confirmed depending on numbers. Only those students who return their consent form by Wednesday 6 March will participate.

Procedures for students in the City

As our duty of care for our students includes seeing them heading safely home, we strongly discourage students from venturing into the city at the end of the school day if possible. For students who need to go into or through the city at the end of the day, or for students who have to wait in the city for more than half an hour to catch a connecting bus, a note from a parent/carer giving them permission to be in the city is required. These notes should be shown to a either the Director of Primary Years or a Head of House before going into the city and students will be issued with a City Pass. A Pass can be issued for students who go into town every afternoon to wait for a bus, or for students who regularly go into town on one or two afternoons a week for purposes such as a dance class or to meet parents at their place of work. Passes can also be issued on a one-off basis if good reason is provided. Passes will only be issued with a signed request from a parent/carer, which should be brought to school before students go into the city.

If in the city in College uniform, students must ensure they are wearing it correctly, including boater and blazer.

Beginning of Year Mass

Lent

Next week sees the beginning of Lent, the time of penance, reflection and fasting for Catholics as we begin our preparations for the most important feast in the liturgical year. Easter. It begins on Ash Wednesday, and the school will be observing this day with liturgies for both Primary and Secondary students. A look back in time

As you commence another school year with its pathways of hopes, dreams and excitement laid out in front of you, my mind recalls the historical events that have gone before.

St Joseph's School was already in Hobart before the first Sisters of Charity arrived in 1847. By 1922 when they had been in charge of both the Girls and Boys School in Harrington Street, Hobart, they needed a larger school. The large St Joseph's College was built in Molle Street, and opened in 1923. It was a beautiful building and, today as I have just celebrated my 101st birthday, I recall with gratitude and happy memories the years I spent there as a student.

In 1942 the Sisters took charge of Mount Carmel Infant School in View Street, Sandy Bay and when the classes moved into Primary they moved to your wonderful site on Sandy Bay Road. When the students were moving at the end of their Grade 6 year, questions were asked: Do we create a Year 7? Some thought it would be too close to St Joseph's College at Molle Street – a compromise was reached –the two schools were joined together! The classes from St Joseph's College were joined with the Primary classes and this created Mount Carmel College bringing you the gift of 110 years of history. Thus making your College a VERY SPECIAL COLLEGE!

I recently read an article in the New York Times, **Books Can Take You Places Donald Trump Doesn't Want You To Go**, that particularly resonated with me as a reader. I have included an excerpt here that you may like to share with your child/children when encouraging them to read.

Whenever I was encouraged by my elders to pick up a book, I was often told, "Read so as to know the world." And it is true; books have invited me into different countries, states of mind, social conditions and historical epochs; they have offered me a place at the most unusual gatherings. I have had access to private rooms, overheard exquisite conversations and been able to observe subtle changes in iNewsletter - Print

another person's inner life. Books have shown me horror and beauty. All this is true.

But the most magical moments in reading occur not when I encounter something unknown but when I happen upon myself, when I read a sentence that perfectly describes something I have known or felt all along. I am reminded then that I am really no different from anyone else.

Perhaps that secret motive behind every library: to stumble upon ourselves in the lives and lands and tongues of others. And the more foreign the setting, the more poignant the event seems. For a strange thing occurs then: a distance widens and then it is crossed. (Maillard, 2017)


