At a time when the world is in shock over the tragic shooting in Christchurch, the Prime Minister of New Zealand, Jacinda Ardern epitomizes the strength of character needed to lead a country through the tough times ahead. It is the little acts of kindness that speak to us of a great leader, the human touch, the kind word and the steely determination not to give into the terror campaign. Our hearts ache when we hear the stories of those who were there or whose loved ones lost their lives. The flow on effect of such violence ripples through a global world. As schools we endeavour to teach tolerance and compassion in a just and inclusive way. These acts of violence, on a community who had stopped to pray, is unfathomable. As young women of today, there are many opportunities that are presented and choosing wisely is just a small part of the puzzle.

As we move forward from the Christchurch terror, we look to our leaders to solve these injustices and acts of hate. To choose courage and compassion as the way forward. To build connections with those they meet and to develop a respect for the uniqueness and sameness that we all share.

## From the Deputy Principal

### Kinder - Year 10 Learning Conferences

Learning Conferences were held on Monday evening and were very successful. A reminder that the second scheduled night of Learning Conferences is next Tuesday, April 2 and bookings can only be made via the PTO Online booking system. Bookings will close at 8.00am on Monday 1 April. Usernames and passwords were sent out to all parents and carers last week via EdSmart. If this information has been misplaced please contact the College Office.

It is expected that every student in Years 4 to 10 will attend the conference with their parent/carer that their progress to date can be reviewed and academic goals can be considered and agreed upon. These evenings are scheduled to provide opportunities for students to develop and take responsibility for their own learning, and to recognise areas of strength and weakness.

### Years 7 - 10 Camps : 10-12 April (Week 10B)

The Year 7 camp experience will take place at Spring Beach Convention Centre and will include team and outdoor activities to strengthen current

friendships and encourage new ones.

The Year 8 camp experience will take place on Bruny Island and will be a major part of the STRIVE program for 2019. There will be camping (including tent/ fuel stove use), bushwalking and team building activities across the three days.

The Year 9 camp experience will take place on the Tasman Peninsula and include Port Arthur Historic Site. It will include a cross-curricular History/English/Science/Art focus.

The Year 10 camp experience will take place at Huonville PCYC and will include a community outreach focus in the surrounding area.

We are committed to providing well-sequenced and educationally valuable camp experiences for students which will facilitate a range of benefits, among these:

- The development of a sense of connectedness with peers, teachers and school, vital for learning to occur
- The development of social skills, independence and resilience
- A sense of achievement and skill mastery
- The fostering of team building and leadership skills.

The camp program offered at the College is considered to be a vital part of each student's educational journey and as such, is compulsory. Camps are not an optional activity and a reminder that all Camp Permission and Medical forms should now have been returned.

## Bus Concerns

We are very fortunate at Mount Carmel to have a number of excellent bus services that provide for safe and convenient transport to and from school and generally we can rely on our students to behave in a safe and courteous fashion on buses. However, from time to time students and/or parents raise concerns about bus travel to and from school. Where these concerns relate to the behaviour of Mount Carmel students on buses, you are encouraged to contact any of the Heads of House or myself and parents/carers can be assured that these concerns will be followed up. All Mount Carmel Students sign a commitment to the Agreement in support of Safer Transport, which appears in the Student Planner and any behaviour on buses that does not comply with these expectations will be addressed.

Where concern is expressed about the bus service itself, you are also very welcome to contact the College. Your concerns may relate to safety issues such as a lack of seats available for students on buses or the inconvenience of routes or timetables. Any issues brought to our attention at the College will be conveyed to bus operators and a satisfactory outcome will be sought. If you do have a concern of this nature I strongly recommend that you also make direct contact with the bus service provider as the importance of the issue is emphasised when a number of voices raise the same concerns.

## Winter Uniform

All students are to be in full winter uniform on the first day of Term 2, Tuesday 30 April.

It is, therefore, timely to remind parents and students to give some attention to ensuring winter uniforms are ready over the next few weeks. To assist parents with any final winter uniform requirements, the College Uniform Shop will be open during the first week of the school holidays, Monday 14 - Thursday 18 April from 10am to 4pm daily. Any alterations to Uniform Shop opening hours will be published on the College Facebook page.

For those families who ordered winter uniform items, these can now be collected from the Uniform Shop.

The full details about the Winter Uniform are published in the College Planner, pages 16 & 17 however, a few key reminders:

- All students should be in the revised uniform from Term 2, 2019 the transition period has now expired the only year group given an exemption to this are the students in the Year 10 cohort.
- **The College polar vest is no longer part of the College Uniform at any year level.** Those girls in the winter uniform can purchase the knitted vest to be worn as an additional layer with either the College cardigan or jumper.
- Navy stockings are to be worn with the winter uniform not socks from Year 6 -10.
- Please note that sunhats are optional in Term 2.
- Secondary students are permitted to wear their full College tracksuit in Term 2 and 3 when your daughter has two periods (minimum) of sport-related lesson eg: double HPE lesson, Dance, or Sports Science.

### Restorative Practice Leaders

Central to the mission of Mount Carmel College is the building of positive relationships, mutual respect and responsibility within a secure and supportive structure. When relationships break down a restorative practice approach helps us to restore right relationships and bring about healing after some harm or hurt has been done to another or others.

The Year 6 Restorative Practice Leaders work with students who are experiencing difficulty in the yard during lunch time. A key feature of the Restorative Practice approach is a series of questions that focus on what has happened, who has been harmed and what needs to happen to restore or repair the hurt as a result of a given conflict.

- What happened?
- What were you thinking at the time?
- Who has affected by what you have done? In what way?
- What do you think you need to do to make things right?

### Cyber Safety : Messaging - Messaging - Messaging

## Fire Safety

A firefighter from the Tasmania Fire Service (TFS) will be visiting the College in the final week of Term One to present a Home Fire Safety Program to our Prep to Grade 6 students. Kindergarten students, whilst not receiving a structured lesson, can expect a visit from the firefighter, who will provide activities for the students.

The age appropriate program is designed to raise fire awareness in children and includes fun in-class activities, videos, activity books, giveaways and an informative website: [www.tfseducation.com.au](http://www.tfseducation.com.au). Parents and other family members are also encouraged to participate by reading the information and assisting your child with the after-school activities.

The TFS aims to deliver appropriate fire safety education to every primary school child in Tasmania and is part of their ongoing commitment to create a fire safe Tasmania. Key Fire Safety Messages include:

- Wake up - install a smoke alarm in every bedroom
- Plan and practice a home fire escape plan with the whole family
- In a fire crawl low and go, go, go to the nearest exit
- In an emergency call triple zero
- Keep flammable material at least two metres from the heater
- If your clothes catch fire, stop, drop, rock and roll
- Keep matches and lighters away from children
- Cooking - turn it off before you turn away
- Cool a burn under cold water for at least 20 minutes

Most house fires can be avoided. Make your home fire safe.

- Maya Chapman U13, Charlotte Webb who swam in U15 and Annabelle Raymond who swam in U16 all performed really well, each picking up a heat win.

Parent Nominations are called for membership of the College Board. The Board fulfils a valuable role within our College community and we recognise the commitment and contribution of all Board members.


