





Reflection

Identity and Mission

Holy Week and Easter

It seems rather strange that we are celebrating Palm Sunday and reflecting upon the Stations of the Cross in the week before Holy week. It is just the way the holidays fall this year, however, I am sure it will pave the way for next week and students will have the opportunity to reflect upon their experiences of Palm Sunday and the Stations of the Cross.

Australian Scripture scholar, Brendan Bryne SJ, reminds us of the line in a movie, "When you are in love, you look out at the world through another pair of eyes". What if we looked out at the world through the eyes of Jesus? What did he see?

Although the world in which we live is a beautiful place, he'd have seen what we see today - a world that is unfortunately still marred by so many natural disasters, so much anger and violence, illness, and addiction. Jesus chose to enter into this world and to let it enter into him! This is actually what Jesus did when he suffered and died on the cross. He willingly and trustingly opened his arms to the suffering of the whole world. He didn't protect himself or resist! He said "Yes" to it and allowed it to come into his body – and he held our pain and transformed it into love. Jesus enters our pain and heals it from within!

On Good Friday, we will hear again these words from Isaiah: He took our infirmities and bore our diseases.

Jesus is the bearer of our burdens, our sins, and our pain. The wonder of this is that God is offering us transformation in the person of Jesus. In Jesus, our human brokenness becomes whole.

Today our Early Years students re-enacted the story of Palm Sunday and what a wonderful job they did. Waving palms and with loud voices they sang 'Sing it Hosanna!' Through mime and reading the Gospel story students retold the story of Jesus' triumphant journey into Jerusalem.

Tomorrow, in various locations around the College, our Years 3 to 6 students will depict the Stations of the Cross through freeze frames. This is the first time we have embarked on a venture like this and I am sure the students will do a wonderful job of telling Jesus' story from the Last Supper to Easter Sunday. Parents are most welcome to attend, with the liturgy commencing at 9.45am.

Caritas Kilometres for Compassion

Yesterday, students from Kinder to Year 6 along with their buddies took part in the Kilometres for Compassion walk around the block. The Mission Sisters enthusiastically prepared this event and impressively were very keen to promote it.

Curriculum News

Transition Program

Last Wednesday our Year 10 students and staff went to Guilford Young College for their Careers Expo. Representatives from UTAS, TAFE, industry, apprenticeship and traineeship employers, Australian Defence Force, Tasmanian Police, Tasmanian Ambulance Service and more were in attendance. Students had the time to roam through the various stalls and to spend time collecting information, resources and ask questions. It is the first of our transition experiences for the year.

NAPLAN

Earlier in the week, our Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 students completed their practice NAPLAN tests, which was in addition to the practice sessions run in Term Four last year. No results will be published for these practice tests.

NAPLAN is moving completely online in 2019 from the previously used paper-based assessments. It is hoped that NAPLAN Online will provide better assessment and more precise results. The assessment feature a tailored test design where the questions a student receives will depend on their answers to previous questions.

Actual testing for NAPLAN will be held from 14 - 24 May. We are confident that our students will be well prepared for the test itself and to take the test online.

What is a Library?

As Term 1 draws to a close at Mount Carmel College, I have been reflecting on how the library has been supporting the teaching and learning so far this year at the College. What do we actually do? In what areas, do we need to grow if we are to truly augment teaching and learning at Mount Carmel College?

As a starting point in answering these queries, I have revisited the IFLA/UNESCO School Library Manifesto: The School Library in Teaching and Learning for All (1999). Although this manifesto was created 20 years ago, it remains current with guidelines for its use being updated as recently as 2015 by the International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions. Interestingly, this document has been translated into over 20 languages for use around the world, making it very much a global document for school libraries.

The 'School Library Manifesto' states: The school library provides information and ideas that are fundamental to functioning successfully in today's information and knowledge-based society. The school library equips students with lifelong learning skills and develops the imagination, enabling them to live as responsible citizens.

This statement meaningfully resonates with what we, as library staff, see as our role here at Mount Carmel College Library. We continually update our information sources to ensure that students and teachers have access to the most recent information and ideas from Australia and around the world to inform their teaching and learning programs. We strive to make sure that information is offered in multiple formats to ensure access and engagement for all. Most importantly we want to ensure that students are given the opportunity consider their learning through exploring and valuing diverse 'points of views'. To support their lifetime of learning, we have begun to engage our students in an explicit inquiry process using the Guided Inquiry Design Model developed by Carol Kuhlthau, Leslie Maniotes & Ann Caspari.

Mrs Hill and myself are both enthusiastic lifelong learners, we see it as our role in the library to empower students to also become learners for life and we welcome the opportunity to work with students on their research tasks. With the introduction of the Project Based Learning elective this year we have been really enjoying assisting students in finding information, guiding their inquiry questions and hopefully inspiring them to think creatively and 'out of the box'!

The concept of the school library 'developing the imagination' does not immediately come to mind when considering the role of the school library in a student's education. But we know that knowledge in today's society is fluid and evolving making it ever more important that we cultivate the imaginations of our students so that they have the skills to negotiate and engage fully in our technology driven global society. Professor Pendleton-Jullian, of the Ohio State University, who explores the interchange between culture, environment, and technology across a diverse range of fields from astrophysics, architecture, innovation models for K-12 education, and human and economic development in marginalised populations, states 'that agency in the world today requires a productive entanglement of imagination and action.' (Knowlton.osu.edu, 2019). I plan to ponder this over the holidays and hope to come up with some 'imaginative' pedagogy to further cultivate the imaginations of our students.

Parking

Kiss and Drop Zone

The Kiss and Drop Zone is the semi-circle space directly in front of Providence House and parents/carers can use this zone to drop off or collect their children from the College.

The Zone should have a steady stream of cars accessing and leaving the area on a regular basis, with the zone allowing for four cars at any one time.

To ensure that the safety of ALL our students we ask that parents/carers adhere to the following guidelines.

- Please enter via the Earl St side of Quorn St (University end) by turning left only into the zone
- Upon exiting the zone drivers are to ONLY turn left into Quorn Street and then into Nelson Road. For safety reasons drivers MUST NOT make a right turn out of the zone into Quorn Street.
- · Vehicles are not to be left unattended
- · The Kiss and Drop Zone is not a parking bay
- The maximum stop time is 1 2 minutes
- Students need to be prepared to leave the vehicle promptly with their bags from the passenger side

Parking in Quorn Street

Parents/carers are reminded that parking on the College side of Quorn Street between the College entrance and Earl Street is only permitted until 2.30pm.

Please DO NOT park in this area while waiting for your children in the afternoon. Vehicles parked in this area severely interrupt the smooth flow of traffic through Quorn Street at this busy time of the day.
